Review and reflection on 2023-2024:

The Primary PE and sport premium guidance outlines 5 key priorities that funding should be used towards. It is not necessary that spending has to meet all the key priorities, you should select the priorities that you aim to use any funding towards

1. Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity.
2. Profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement.
3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.
4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
5. Increased participation in competitive sport

Key achievements to date	Areas for further development and baseline evidence of need
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ LVSSCO membership continued and provided opportunities to engage in competitive and non-competitive sport. ▪ As part of mental well-being, each half term started with a well-being welcome back morning in which the staff and children engaged in well-being, PSHE and sports activities. ▪ External coaches have provided specific coaching for certain sports, cricket, tennis. ▪ School has had some sporting success, such as winning the gymnastics competition and coming joint 3rd in the rounders' tournament. ▪ Children make good use of the daily mile (Walk the World) providing fitness opportunities for all. ▪ Some sports equipment has been replaced and replenished ensuring high quality resources for the teaching and learning of PE and sports. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Continue to develop the equipment available at play and lunch times to encourage the children to have active break times. ▪ Consider how children can still have active break times even when the weather is wet. ▪ Provide further CPD opportunities for staff to ensure that they are confident in all the disciplines they are required to deliver, especially in gymnastics. ▪ Develop opportunities for outdoor learning, particularly orienteering to be a key feature of teaching throughout Key Stage 1 and 2. ▪ Full attendance at school partnership interschool competitions ▪ Identify vulnerable and SEND children who do not take part in physical activity, understand their preferences and look to provide opportunities for engagement.
